OFFICIALS READY FOR THE YEAR

On January 2, 2018, the North Braddock council was reorganized for the new year. Honorable Scott Schricker was in attendance to swear in two new council members, three incumbent council members, & the mayor. Teresa Parker & Bridgette Cobbs took the oath of office for the very first time for their four year council term. Incumbents Jerome Sepesy, Chris Roland, Vicki Vargo, & Mayor Tom Whyel took the oath for being re-elected to another four year term. Ward 3 council member Richard Kostyak resigned from his remaining term and Joe Barbusio was appointed to the position for the remaining term that expires in December 2019. John Vahosky was appointed council president & Mike Dobrinich as vice president by their council peers. The council president designated council committees for the new year. New council members Parker & Cobbs attended a newly elected official's boot camp for two days at the end of January. Council meetings continue to meet on the third Tuesday of each month with the work session at 6:30 PM and the meeting at 7:00 PM.








SPRING CLEAN UP

PETITION TO DECREASE COUNCIL

North Braddock council is making a move to reduce the size of boro council from nine seats to seven seats. Council member Chris Roland endorsed the petition for registered voters to sign. At least 5% of registered voters have to sign the petition to approach the courts to make the change. See your elected officials or contact the boro office to see how you can sign your name to the petition. North Braddock has the largest council in the area and the government size does not reflect the population decline. There's a lack of interest to find public servants to lead the community. A reduction in council would benefit residents for the future.

TURN ON THE LIGHTS

Spotlights were finally turned on for evening safety at the public park on Brinton Avenue. Two LED spotlights were added with the rehabilitation project funded by grant money and boro general fund tax dollars. The two LED fixtures improve the lighting throughout the park and around the surrounding area. The park closes as dusk and all residents are to leave the park. Original plans included the park being checked and the gates being closed nightly. Ten LED street lights were also added on Brinton, Shaver, Sheridan, Wolfe, & Lilly.



FIRE STATION PROJECT COMPLETED

The fire station renovation project was completed with the trucks moving back into their home on Wolfe Avenue by the end of January 2018. Customers at the fish fry noticed the major upgrades to the building. The fish fry had a successful Lenten season at the remodeled station and the volunteer organization thanked the community for the continuous support. It was recently announced that the department will receive additional state grant money in the amount of \$13,201. The grant was made possible by the Fire Company and Volunteer Ambulance Service Grant Program. It can be used for repairing, building or renovating facilities. The funds also can be applied toward the purchase of new equipment or staff training and certification, or they may go to repay debt related to equipment purchases or facility building and maintenance.



RESIDENTS ADDRESS COUNTY COUNCIL

North Braddock Residents for Our Future addressed Allegheny County Council Allegheny County Health Department regarding the emission violations at the ET Steel Works & fracking being proposed on the mill property in North Versailles. Concerned residents want the County to reassure that the County Health Department will be actively involved on the issues in order to serve the best interests for community health. Members of the volunteer group are also canvassing the streets with door to door discussions to engage residents with information regarding the issues. The fracking project is still in the permit phase.



DEMOLITION FUNDING



State Rep. Paul Costa announced a grant awarded to North Braddock through the Allegheny County Economic Development - Community Infrastructure and Tourism Fund (CITF).

The grant awarded for \$100,000 is for the demolition of deteriorated residential properties in North Braddock.

Demolition funding assists with razing blighted structures. Many owners walk away and leave the responsibility on the local government. Hundreds of structures need to be demolished in the community.

EMERGENCY DECLARATION

U.S. Route 30 on the border of North Braddock & East Pittsburgh was slowly subsiding over the past months. The roadway suffered a large landslide on April 7, 2018. The roadway was shut down to traffic before the landslide. PennDOT, East Pittsburgh, & North Braddock have made emergency declarations to expedite the repair process. Drivers will follow the detours for the next several months until repairs are made.


