
About The Newsletter:

NEW PARK PROPOSED FOR WARD 3

There currently is no public park for local youth in Ward 3, but there are public used parks located in the other two wards. Councilman Michael Breaston suggested the recreational park idea to be added to his voting district. Vacant land was identified along the 400 block of Hawkins Avenue. Borough administration plans to obtain properties from the vacant property recovery program though Allegheny County. The planned site would include a play equipment area, open field area, etc. Residents can make suggestions to council on what they would like to see incorporated into the new park. PRIMARY ELECTION ONLY MONTHS AWAY

The municipal primary election is coming up on Tuesday, May 16, 2017. Polls will open at 7:00 AM & remain open until 8:00 PM at the designated three locations within North Braddock. All voters must be registered by April 17, 2017. There are numerous local office positions up for election this year. The mayor position is up for election. There are five council seats that are up for election including two seats in Ward 1, two seats in Ward 2, and one seat in Ward 3. The five council seats elected can carry a lot of weight for future decisions. In addition, the borough tax collector is also up for election. Candidates must meet minimum requirements including being 18 years of age, registered to vote, resident of North Braddock for at least one year, and obtain 10 voter signatures for the ballot petition. Candidates can run for any of their respected political parties or Independent to make a change in public office. The majority of registered voters fall under the Democrat party in North Braddock.
