FOR THE FIRST TIME COUNTY POLICE BEGAN BORO PATROL BY CONTRACT FOR WILMERDING IN 2017 Some residents have expressed the need to improve community police coverage. The goal should be to improve services by eliminating part time policing in the future. One possibility is contracting County Police for coverage similar to the Wilmerding contract. Expenses and plans would have to be worked out with talks between the Boro and County officials. North Braddock's current budget for policing was priced at \$536,100. Boro police liability insurance has increased from \$22,000 to \$49,000 since 2016. The community has a lot of turnover and issues with part time policing standards. Residents see new officers being sworn in on a steady basis at council meetings. Full time policing might be able to resolve some of these issues while possibly saving tax dollars depending on the contract expenses with another department. The topic is worth the research in order to weigh the best options for the future.

COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS




The Bowers Street basketball court was reopened with a new rim & other improvements.
